### A Court of Silver Flames by Sarah J Maas




### This Woven Kingdom by Tahereh Mafi




### Skander and the Unicorn Thief by A F Steadman










# Year 9 student wins main award in national story writing competition

Every half term, the Young Writers organisation offer national competitions in creative writing for students aged 11-16. During the 2021 Autumn term, pupils across KS3 and KS4 were asked to write stories with a twist, told from perspectives of known villains. One submission was very successful – Haya M from Year 9 won the main award, and together with four other students from across the country was awarded with an opportunity to write and publish her own book. It is a great success for Haya and a massive recognition for Bentley Wood.

We asked Haya to share a few words about her writing process and the content of her mini-saga:

I knew that there were so many possible perspectives to write from; ways to paint each character in a new light. So, I settled for what could be described as morbid, death.

Death plays a significant role in all of our lives, for many it is the cause of grief and anguish, which is why I chose it. In my piece, I wanted to display a version of death which allows the reader to decide whether it is a form of good or evil letting the reader decide whether this entity is actually twisted or not.

# Year 7 learn about Norman history

### Year 7 Trip to Windsor Castle

On Friday 27th May, all of Year 7 went to Windsor Castle as part of an enrichment trip for their History curriculum. At the beginning of the year, we learnt about William the Conqueror and the methods he used to take and maintain control of England when he invaded England in 1066. Building castles for protection and as a sign of power was one of them. As Windsor Castle was built by William himself it was a perfect example of this.

Students took part in two workshops; one to learn about how life in England changed after 1066 and one to uncover the vast weapons used by the knights in times of defence for their country. There was then an opportunity to walk around St Georges Chapel and the State Apartments. Home to numerous paintings, furniture, armour and burial graves, it is clear that Windsor has been loved by many monarchs. Our visit coincided with the Queens Platinum Jubilee and to celebrate Queen Elizabeths 70 years on the throne the castle and surrounding streets had been decorated with posters and Union Jack flags. Some students even made celebratory cards!

It was a glorious day full of sun and historical excitement!

### History students visit Imperial War Museum in Duxford

For our History trip, we went to the Imperial War Museum in Duxford and it took us about forty-five minutes to get there.

We had lunch and then headed to the American Air Museum, a short walk away. There were so many aeroplanes on display with museum labels so we could identify and learn about the planes. There were also stories and videos, such as testimonies from D-Day and colour photographs from World War Two.

# **Classics Summer Term 2022**

The Classics department have had a fantastic Summer term, bringing the ancient world to life for our students. We have taken our Year 9 Latin students to Bath in Somerset, our A level Classical Civilisation students to the British Museum and we established Bentley Wood's biannual Greek Tragedy Summer festival.

# Classics trip to Bath

Our Year 9 Latin class went on a trip to Bath in order to learn more about the ancient Roman baths. When we first arrived in the city, we were all captivated by the old buildings that lined the streets; it was like dipping into a world where the old truly lived alongside the modern.

When we had finally entered inside Aqua Sulis, we were given auditory guides that we listened to whilst walking around the museum and different parts of the baths. We learnt a lot including about the hypocaust system which Romans invented and used to create and keep the baths warm. The ancient Romans are in some ways a mystery to us, but their intellectual achievements are still important foundation blocks for our modern world.

Lunchtime pulled in at around half past twelve, and we were escorted by the person who would lead our teaching session. The session was fun and full of activities that kept us thinking; the Latin we learned in our lessons helped us to decipher Roman tombstones! I think my favorite part of this was when we were permitted to look and touch some replicas and actual artefacts from the Roman Baths. This added greatly to our experience and helped develop our knowledge more, as we were able to really imagine what it was like to be Roman in those times.

Overall, this Bath trip was incredibly insightful and educational as well as enjoyable (the gift shop being a permanent favourite of those that went!) and is recommendable to anyone wishing to learn more about the Romans.





## Healthy Eating Week

This year's 10th Healthy Eating Week took place from 13 - 17 June 2022. The main message this year was, Eat well for you and the planet!

The foods and drinks we choose are important for our health and the health of the planet. Globally, food production is responsible for about a third of all greenhouse gas emissions, uses over two-thirds of fresh water and over a third of available land. Our global population is growing, with an increasing demand for food, but it is important for the health of the planet that we find ways to produce this food using less land, water, and energy. The environmental impact of different foods can vary but there are some general principles we can all follow to aim for a healthier and more sustainable diet.

# Students get out in nature for investigative field work

### Geography trip to the beautiful beaches of West Wittering

On June 22nd 2022, the Geography Dept took 140 Year 10 and 12 students to West Wittering Beach in order to carry out field work for their unit 3 exams.

### GCSE Geography field work at Bentley Priory River

After the trip, students completed a detailed write-up, applying geographical skills to make lovely graphs and developed data presentation skills. The girls then analysed their results, made conclusions linking back to predictions and finally evaluated the trip with good experiences and ways to improve.

Students felt lucky to have a river on their school doorstep and enjoyed exploring the beautiful site next to the school. When asked about the trip, one student said she felt as though she could take on an adventure with Bear Grylls! Overall, it was a fantastic trip and are so pleased the staff and students attending all felt the same way.

The Senior Mathematical Challenge is a 90-minute, multiple-choice Challenge. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. All students will receive a certificate of participation. To recognise the highest performers in the Challenge, UKMT award the top-scoring 66% of participants Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates.









## UKMT Junior Maths Challenge 2022

On Wednesday 27th April, a selected group of Year 7 and 8 students completed the Junior Maths Challenge paper organised by the UK Maths Trust. The papers are designed to stimulate mathematical problem solving, encourage learners to think outside-the-box and apply mathematical skills learnt in lessons to sophisticated conundrums.

The Junior Maths Challenge is run by the UK Mathematics Trust and supported by the Institute and Faculty of Actuaries. It is aimed at those in Years 7 and 8 and is sat in schools. Over 250,000 students from across the UK sat the Junior Maths Challenge with roughly the top 6% receiving a gold certificate, the next 13% silver and the next 21% bronze. 

### Protecting Human Rights at Bentley Wood!

Bentley Wood sixth form outshines many sixth forms within the area, due to their outstanding and numerous enrichment activities. One that is loved by many is Amnesty Club. This club takes place every Thursday lunchtime where all sixth formers are invited to join and speak about current issues relating to human rights.

During the club we discuss many relevant issues and events in addition to topics that we believe have correlation to human rights. The Amnesty Club members create a safe and non-judgmental environment allowing everyone to share their views without feeling judged. A Microsoft Team has been established allowing all members to share pictures, articles as well as topics that they want to discuss in the sessions. One of the keys topics we explored, at the beginning of the year was family and refugees. This topic was extremely interesting and touching to look at as it was so relevant to the time, as we were discussing it during the time of the horrific events that had taken place in Afghanistan and the Taliban rule.

We spoke about the threats that Afghans now face and what the UK is doing to help them. One of the ways that we acted in support was through signing an Amnesty petition which encouraged the UK government to do more to support refugees. Within the topic of refugees, we discussed the idea of losing family and how important family and friends are. We all wrote what family meant to us anonymously and it was put into a poem. This was a very personal and emotional activity that allowed us to really appreciate the privilege that we have living in this country and being safe as well as having the advantage of being surrounded by our family all the time.

One of the greatest advantages that Amnesty Club offers, are the debates! They are always exceptionally fun and well thought out. It allows members to share their views on heated topics while also being respectful and mindful of others' views and opinions. The topics that are debated are issues that mean something to the members, for example women's safety and whether the voting age should be lowered?

We discussed the vastly spoken about COP26 and climate change. This topic is hugely important to our generation as we are the last generation that can stop the effects of climate change and we are the generation that are facing the effects of climate change. Throughout our sessions we have linked climate change and human rights by arguing that the effects of climate change are breaching the human rights that claims "everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for...health and wellbeing" under article 25. We decided to act within our sixth form! We created an eye-catching and distinctive poster that we placed in our common room to remind everyone the detrimental impacts of climate change.

Amnesty club is truly humbling and thrilling as it takes our learning beyond the classroom and expands our knowledge and understanding on issues and events that are taking place all over the world that affect our human rights. Crucially one of the most valuable lessons that this club has taught us is that our voices can be heard no matter where we are in the world and fundamentally the power that us young people have to make a difference.



The students who helped said "It was honestly such a great memory to make and the smell of the food drew people into the Kitchen."







### Bentley Wood High School Reunion

On Saturday 2nd July almost 100 alumni joined together for a school reunion. Former students and staff of Heriots Wood grammar School and Bentley Wood High School met up and reminisced about their days at the school. There were many memorable stories exchanged with lots of laughter ringing through the school. Everyone enjoyed exploring the building and remembering their classrooms and the subjects they learned.

Students from 1957 onwards through each decade were represented. The leavers of 1982 were the women who initiated the reunion as they were celebrating 40 years. We all enjoyed listening to our current choir who sang and to other students singing a duet. It was also great to receive a letter from Mrs Shucksmith the first deputy head teacher of Heriots Wood Grammar School. We loved the words that she sent. It confirmed that the CARE values and inclusive ethos of Bentley Wood started on day 1 of the school opening, 76 years ago. We are hoping to hold a reunion in 2026 to celebrate the 70th year of the school. Please see below the wonderful memories of Mrs Shucksmith.

#### The early days of Heriots Wood School

Being involved in the foundation of the school in 1955 was the most immense privilege. Imagine being entrusted to set up a new school from scratch. The new building was to cost £200,000 and the furniture for the whole school cost £12,000, which obviously seems a ludicrously small amount in today's terms. The school also had the luxury of a site of 26 acres to sit in, which made it feel almost rural, rather than just part of suburban London.

The school opened with just 68 of the youngest secondary age girls - a number deemed manageable as systems were set up and the school gradually came into being. At first, while the new school was being built, the girls met in the old Victorian church school building by All Saints Church in Harrow Weald. Living in this draughty old building warmed by a couple of coal fires and starting this small meant that I and my colleagues developed a real sense of community in building the school up. By September 1956 the new building was almost complete and we were able to take over on the site, with a new headmistress, Miss Williams, appointed and another intake of 102 girls in three forms. Over the ensuing years numbers of girls and teachers grew and in 1959 when the school roll was complete a ceremonial opening and service of dedication took place, with guests from the council and - notably - Dame Janet Vaughan, the Principal of Somerville College Oxford, one of the first two women's colleges at Oxford. The school was aiming high for its pupils in inviting such a luminary to open it.

Although the school operated within a traditional grammar school curriculum, it emphasised from the start the need for girls to be well rounded and informed in broader ways, and field study and overseas trips were a commonplace at a time when these would not have been pursued everywhere. I was not only Deputy Head but also Head of Geography and organised many of these trips, often taking along my young son Mark, who was always spoiled by the girls and taught many new card tricks! For me the thrill of having a purposebuilt geography room with its own projection facilities was immense. There were no computers in those days of course, but traditional class teaching would be supplemented by film reels, slide shows, practical activities and so on.

In those early days parts of the grounds were gradually developed into sports facilities, but there were enough wild areas remaining to trigger the imagination of the younger girls, who would arrive at school carrying bits of old carpet to furnish their 'dens'! The site felt so rural that I have a vivid memory of sitting marking in my room when all was quiet and hearing the cuckoos call all around us. From my office window I could see girls arrive for school each morning. In winter they would be wearing gaberdine raincoats and berets over their uniforms. In summer, these would be replaced by uniform cotton dresses, school blazers and Panama hats. The staff would look strange to modern children as they were also formally dressed in their black academic gowns in school.

I am 99 years old now and my mobility is poor, but I still take a keen interest in hearing about Bentley Wood High School, as it has now become. Nearly thirty years of teaching in that school shaped most of my adult life until I retired in 1983. I wish you all a very happy reunion and send good wishes to all girls that might remember me.



## Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school


