



The Judgement of Yoyo Gold by Isaac Blum

When Yoyo Gold's best friend is cast out of their Orthodox Jewish community over a minor transgression, she starts making videos on TikTok to vent her frustrations and speak out over the injustice faced by her friend. But then one of her videos goes viral, bringing upon her the wrath of her family and community. Will Yoyo lose the will to fight for what she feels is right?

The Night Fox by Ashley Wilda

Seventeen-year-old Eli is a reluctant guest at Raeth, a remote mountain retreat for teens with mental health issues. She decides to fake her recovery so she can return home quickly. What she soon learns is that the retreat itself has other ideas. The valley's magical surroundings transform each time she ventures out, playing with her mind and dredging up her grief-laden memories.

Wrath of the Triple Goddess by Rick Riordan

Percy needs three recommendation letters from the gods before his final year in high school comes to an end. To secure his second letter, Percy and his friends Annabeth and Grover agree to a new quest – pet-sitting for the goddess Hecate while she's away over Halloween. Things don't go quite to plan and the trio find themselves with a giant goat, a destroyed house, and Hecate's (terrifying and potentially deadly) pets on the loose in New York City.

Cobweb by Michael Morpurgo

Britain. 1815. After years of loss and sacrifice, the end of the war with Napoleon is approaching. Cobweb is a young puppy who knows nothing of the war but he is taken away from his owner and sold to become a Drover's Dog – herding sheep and cattle for hundreds of miles on the long, treacherous journey to London. After the war, Cobweb meets an unexpected stranger with an incredible tale to tell on his journey home . . .

Sisters of Fire and Fury by Laura Bates

In this feminist Arthurian fantasy, Cass and the sisterhood have no time to rest on their laurels after defeating Mordaunt's men. Enemies threaten them from all sides and and they must recuit new women to fight off invading forces. Meanwhile Cass' blossoming powers and destiny call to her but she struggles to face them without her mentor. How can she become a leader when she doesn't know who she is?

Red in Tooth and Claw by Lish McBride

Faolan Kelly's grandfather dies when she is only seventeen, and she is shipped off to the Settlement – a place rife with mystery and kept afloat by suspicious wealth. When Faolan finds the body of a Settlement boarder mangled by something that can't possibly be human, it's clear something vicious is stalking the palisades. And as Settlement boarders continue to drop like flies, Faolan knows she must escape to evade the creature's wrath.






Sleep Like Death by Kalynn Bayron


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New Library Leaders recruited

Year 10 Psychology students get clever and creative for Brain Week









Brain posters, models and cakes

Psychology students in Ms Griffins Year 10 psychology classes enjoyed 'Brain Week' this October with projects designed by Ms Bloom. We are studying criminology this term, in particular what makes a criminal's brain different to a healthy brain. Students were given a project to create a poster and a model of the average human brain and research the differences to a criminal brain. Students used a variety of different materials and textures, even food!

Three students baked different 'brain cakes' and iced them with different colours relating to brain areas or sweets on top for each brain area. One student had questions attached to various cupcakes relating to a particular part of the brain. When we answered the question correctly, we got to eat the cupcake!

Students presented interesting and well researched ideas and case studies. Some examples being, if a criminal has a shrunken pre-frontal cortex (which is sometimes the case) this can inhibit them from making logical and rational decisions and therefore this led to them to committing crimes. They are unable to manage impulse control or moral reasoning. If there are issues in their amygdala they will have trouble processing feelings such as guilt and empathy and so can often go on to commit multiple murders or


have psychopathic tendencies! Students had researched very interesting case studies and also found statistics such as the fact that criminals with low activity in the anterior cingulate gyrus have a higher risk of offending. Great work from all Year 10 Psychology students and a very enjoyable week of lessons.























Students enjoy various activities on European Day of Languages

Bentley Wood High School Careers Fair 2024 provided students with a broader range of organisations in attendance to give the girls the opportunity to open their minds to occupational areas that they may not have considered. Healthcare continues to be the popular choice for students at Bentley Wood so the presence of both the Royal National Orthopaedic Hospital and the National Blood and Transplant service provided more of an insight into specialist healthcare and health science jobs. Citygate car dealership brought an ID4 E-car which was a very popular experience for many students, increasing awareness of the range of jobs involved in the design, manufacture and selling of motor vehicles.

The British Army is the largest recruiter of apprentices in the UK. They challenge the stereotype of the army being about warfare and that its role is primarily to defend the UK and to maintain peace. The recent merger of City University & St Georges University combining the strengths of both institutions in healthcare, plus business, economics and law at City were very popular choices among our 6th form students, many of whom want to remain in London

Many congratulations to all our girls for their excellent results and a big thank you to our Maths Department for preparing the students.












Halloween Relay

Black History Month Celebration in Maths

For this year's Black History Month, the competition for our girls was to draw their own clock and use mathematical expressions for the sequence of numbers. We drew inspiration for this competition from the achievements and legacy of Benjamin Banneker. The son of former slaves, Benjamin Banneker, worked on the family tobacco farm but received some education. At 15, he took over the farm and invented an irrigation system to control water flow to the crops from nearby springs, which led the farm to flourish even during droughts.

In the early 1950s, Benjamin borrowed a pocket watch from a neighbour, took the watch apart and studied its components. After returning the watch, he created a fully functioning clock entirely out of wooden pieces. The clock was amazingly precise and would keep ticking for decades. As a result of the attention his self-made clock received, Banneker was able to start his own watch and repair business.

Diversity and Inclusion in Maths



























Enrichment clubs this term

Year 7 Science Club

In our science experiment we explored the effects of light and dark variables on the behaviour of maggots. When exposed to light, they tend to avoid bright areas, which can be for protection from predators (birds) and harsh environmental conditions. On the other hand, when in complete darkness, their movement may become more unpredictable as they search for food sources. By changing the light conditions - like using bright lights versus complete darkness - scientists can see how these changes impact the maggot's behaviour, helping us to understand how they adapt to their environment. By far, this was my favourite experiment and hope to do some more soon!

At our recent Science Club, we conducted an intriguing experiment to explore the fascinating behaviour of maggots and their preference for darkness over the light! After putting on our safety goggles, we set up a container, one half in the light, and the other with a folded black paper on top. After releasing a group of maggots into the set up, we all eagerly observed their movements over a set period of time. To our surprise the majority of the maggots crawled towards the darkened area, showing us all their natural preference to find places with less light!

After watching the maggots crawl to the darker side, we decided to take it a step further and grab a cotton ball slightly dampened with water. We carefully opened the lid (making sure nothing jumps out at us) and placed the cotton ball near to the dark side. Almost immediately, the maggots started circling the cotton ball.

At the end of this experiment, we had all learnt a fascinating fact that maggots also have preferences, just like us! It was a fantastic and enlightening experience demonstrating even the smallest creatures have unique preferences. This experiment was definitely my favourite out of all the previous experiments we had done in Science Club!





KS5 Chemistry students experience a stimulating visit to University of Oxford

Last week, our KS5 Chemistry students had the incredible opportunity to visit the prestigious University of Oxford for their annual KS5 Chemistry Conference: an in-depth exploration of cutting-edge chemistry research and facilities. The afternoon started with small group tours of the university's state-of-the-art undergraduate teaching laboratories, where students were able to see first-hand many of the advanced scientific instruments we have explored as part of KS5 learning.

Among the highlights, was the chance to observe an NMR (Nuclear Magnetic Resonance) machine in action—equipment that plays a pivotal role in organic chemistry research, and one which students will recognise from our curriculum (see photo!).

Following the lab tours, students attended two fascinating lectures. The first, delivered by Dr. Amy Styring, focused on the intersection of science and anthropology: How Chemistry Can Tell Us About the Human Past.

It was eye-opening to see how chemical principles can be applied to uncover secrets about ancient civilisations and in this case, particularly about the diet and the food these communities ate.

The second lecture, Shaking Up Fluorine Chemistry, was given by Calum Patel (DPhil) and delved into novel areas of mechanochemistry. Students were excited to see how topics such as Born Haber Cycles, Nucleophilic Substitution, and NMR and Mass Spectrometry—all key concepts from our syllabus—are being applied to advance modern chemical research.

It was an inspiring and informative day, providing our students with a glimpse of the real-world applications of the topics we study in class. We are thrilled that they were able to take so much away from the experience, and we look forward to attending again at next year's conference!

Year 13 Art trip to Buckingham Palace

On Wednesday, 2nd October seven Year 13 students had the privilege of visiting Buckingham Palace for an inspiring art focused Key Stage 5 event. The afternoon included an insightful talk by artist Jonathan Yeo, painter of the latest portrait of His Majesty the King.

In addition, there were talks by Royal Collection Trust curators about some of the wonderful paintings on display

in the palace and about opportunities for careers in the sector. Students enjoyed learning about the history of some of the key works of art on display and about art conservation.

Students had the opportunity to examine works by Old Masters and to sketch from them in the State Rooms at Buckingham Palace. This was a very special, immersive experience for them and they found inspiration from not just the breathtaking art but also the magnificent surroundings.

Here is one student's account of their day.

We had the prestigious opportunity to visit Buckingham Palace for an event which featured talks by portrait artist Jonathan Yeo and the Royal Collection Trust curatorial team. In addition, we had the opportunity to sketch in the Picture Gallery and Marble Corridor, which has not been offered to the public prior to this event.

The architecture and interiors of Buckingham Palace were breathtaking, with their grandeur complementing the regal atmosphere.

We also had the chance to witness the famous Changing of the Guards ceremony. Standing among the crowd, we soaked in the hustle and bustle, the royal music, and the strict protocol surrounding the event.

The tour by the curatorial teams of the Picture Gallery and the Green Drawing Room focused on 5 key paintings from the collection and shared the history as well as highlighting the key details of the portrait and the clues it may holding.

Moreover, Jonathan Yeo talked about his painting of King Charles and his particular style of painting which he developed over time as well as the relevance of the colour red in his portrait symbolising various things such as power. What piqued my interest the most was the butterfly on his left shoulder. He highlighted the king's kind and humble nature and how well he is connected to the natural world.

Upon arriving at the location, everyone warmed up with delicious hot chocolate, which added a cosy touch to the experience.











Year 13 history students visit Auschwitz in Poland

Two students took part in the Lessons from Auschwitz course, run by the Holocaust Educational Trust and as part of the course they visited Auschwitz in Poland.

Here is the article about their experience of the trip

Hello, my name is Britannia. Abigail and I have been fortunate enough to participate in an amazing opportunity to further our love for history, as well as deepen our historical knowledge, through the Lessons from Auschwitz (LFA) project by the Holocaust Educational Trust.

As part of this project, we attended a range of seminars with expert mentors and had access to extraordinary resources about the Holocaust. These included a rich hub of learning

materials, historical texts, and survivor testimony, such as that of Steven Frank, who shared his story of being transported over 39 hours from Westerbork concentration camp in the Netherlands to Theresienstadt concentration camp in the Czech Republic.

We also explored archival materials, including photographs and films provided by the Trust, which covered various aspects of the Holocaust, the emblem of remembrance, and the pre-war lives of Jewish people across Europe. These resources detailed their assimilation and included case studies of specific groups, highlighting daily life and the rising tide of antisemitism, particularly under Nazi rule in Germany.

As part of this experience, we went on a one-day visit to Poland, where we embarked on an educational journey that deepened our understanding of the Holocaust. We learned about the history of the Holocaust and the role of camps such as Auschwitz-Birkenau.

We reflected on the individuals whose lives were impacted by the Holocaust, and lastly, considered its relevance today and how we could share what we learned with others. During this trip, we visited significant landmarks, such as the town of Oświęcim and the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp, now a memorial and museum.

This included visits to Auschwitz I and Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest of the Nazi concentration and extermination camps, where over 1.1 million of the 6 million victims of the Holocaust lost their lives. We toured the premises, including the gas chambers, the reconstructed "Death Wall" between Block 10 and Block 11, where thousands of prisoners were executed, and the four crematoria at Auschwitz-Birkenau.











We also saw rooms filled with confiscated personal belongings that Jews had brought with them to Birkenau under the false pretence that they were being "resettled to the east", including reading glasses, pots and pans, suitcases, shoes, and prosthetic limbs.

These belongings tragically represented the targeted disabled community, who were seen as a "useless and worthless burden" by the Nazis. Seeing the real human hair of Jewish men, women, and children, shaved upon arrival to prevent the spread of disease, further demonstrated the extreme suffering and dehumanization they endured. The Book Of Names was a key piece of empirical evidence of the Holocaust as it actualises the inconceivable number of

Holocaust victims, and displays their names together with their dates of birth, hometowns and places of death - where known. The massive dimensions of the Book of Names testify to the enormity of the collective and unimaginable loss for humanity as a whole and for the Jewish people in particular. The last pages of the book are empty, symbolizing the names that are yet to be retrieved, documented and commemorated, and which perhaps never will be.

At Auschwitz-Birkenau, we also reflected on the camp's vast size—spanning over 420 acres—and saw the unaltered train tracks that had transported thousands of Jews each day from across Europe. These people endured harsh conditions for long periods, often standing on the same ground we walked, awaiting their fates. The selection process, where individuals were chosen either for forced labor or immediate execution in the

gas chambers, was particularly moving. Those who resisted were shot on sight by guards. We also learned about the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau by Soviet troops on January 27, 1945, and its profound effects.

At the end of our trip, we held a closing reflective meeting where we discussed the day's experiences in depth. We lit candles in commemoration and remembrance of all the innocent lives tragically lost as well as Rabbi Epstein conducted a prayer and sang a few hymns. It is essential to remember the Holocaust as a stark reminder of where unchecked antisemitism, racism, and xenophobia can lead, encapsulated by the phrase "Never Again." By studying this period, we recognize the dangers of hatred, intolerance, and scapegoating, encouraging us to combat these forces in society today. Our mentors consistently reinforced the importance of confronting Holocaust denial and emphasized that "Those who do not remember the past are condemned to repeat it" — George Santayana.

Through our participation in Lessons from Auschwitz, we have been able to enhance my communication skills, work collaboratively with students from other schools, and demonstrate leadership by sharing the legacy of this dark period in history. Along with this newfound knowledge, we are both in the process of receiving an ASDAN-accredited certificate and the opportunity to become a Holocaust Educational Trust Ambassador.

Supporting Teenagers' Mental Health: Tips for Parents

Digital Wellbeing Platform - Govox:

This year, after a trial with Year 9 last year, we rolled out our wellbeing check-in platform (Govox) across Years 9 10, 11, 12 and 13. This is a way to identify students in need of a 'check-in', to deliver them bespoke wellbeing resources, and to take the pulse of how our students are feeling each half-term.

We email them a survey link each half-term, which they are asked to complete. Please do encourage your daughter to complete the survey each half-term. The next one goes out **Monday June 10th** (the second Monday back after half-term).

Whether she's on top of the moon, or down in the dumps, we want to know how she's doing.

Stay Connected: Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams Channel

We often upload new resources, tips, and advice to the **Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel**. Here, you can find a repository of **videos, articles,** guided **meditations,** and more to help you and your daughter cope with stress and anxiety, and to become more resilient.

Select Mental Health & Wellbeing Support at Bentley Wood

We will continue to offer a wide range of support for your daughter at Bentley Wood, including our PSHE curriculum, Wise Thoughts discussions, sports and extracurricular clubs. Some examples follow.

Our 'Healing Hearts Team'. These are a group of staff trained in mental health and wellbeing strategies. These members of staff are available to connect with and speak to students, offering support and guidance for low-level concerns.

We have a fully-trained **Senior Mental Health Lead** who is a Senior Leader, in line with best Government-endorsed practice, and this includes support from the **Harrow Mental Health Support Team.** (MHST)

We have a number of **Counsellors in each week,** including a representative from the **Wish Centre,** in case your daughter requires higher-level intervention than the Healing Hearts Team can provide.

We have our own student **Wellbeing & Mental Health Ambassadors** to lead on whole-school initiatives such as Wise Thoughts, wellbeing Teams tips, and be a friendly face if needed.

For additional wellbeing and mindfulness resources, consider the **Headspace** and **Calm** apps, meditation MP3s in the Student Wellbeing and Mental Health Teams channel, or books such as "Mindfulness: Finding Peace in a Frantic World" by Professor Mark Williams.

To wrap up, I'll share two favourite quotations on mental health once more. Richard Burton, in his 'Anatomy of Melancholy' (1621), suggests that staying active can help alleviate melancholy:

"As fern grows in untilled grounds, and all manner of weeds, so do gross humours in an idle body...They that are idle are far more subject to melancholy than such as are conversant or employed about any office or business."

The Stoic philosopher Epictetus advises, "The first job in life is this. To distinguish between externals I cannot control, and the choices I make about them that I do control."

Staying Safe

Advice for Students:

- Talk to a trusted adult if anyone says or does anything that worries or frightens you. A trusted adult might be a family member or please contact the school – someone will be there to support you.
- Always tell a trusted adult where you are going and what time you will return.
- Don't lend your mobile phone to anyone unless it is an emergency
- Don't let anyone online trick you into doing something or sending pictures against your wishes.
- **Don't share** any passwords/login information keep them private and use complex passwords, too.
- Never give personal information to any person you don't know.

Safety and your mobile phone:

- Speak to a parent/trusted adult about who you are connecting with and not to purchase anything online without gaining an adult's permission first.
- Age Ratings on Apps are there to keep you safe.
- Only connect online with friends and family you know in the physical world and not to accept 'friend play request' from strangers.
- Don't put up with abusive texts, photos or video. Show them to an adult and report them.
- You should always speak to a trusted adult if you see or hear anything online that makes you feel scared or uncomfortable and to never arrange to meet someone who they have met online.
- When sharing images: you need consent to take and share images/videos of others. People also need your consent to take and share your image.
- If an image shows the private parts of a person who is under 18; it IS an indecent image: It is an **offence** if you: save it, share it, keep it, print it, forward it, show it.

With social media you can send messages, share pictures, videos and chat with people all over the world. ... but who are you connecting with?

Anyone can use the Internet. Not everyone is who they say they are and some people are not nice.

Information and advice for students and parents

Free School Meals eligibility

- Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they
 or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits
 below.
- Universal Credit, provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

I don't currently claim free school meals - what does this mean for me?

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals, please see instructions here on how to check and apply.

I am currently claiming free school meals - what does this mean for me? Most people won't be affected by the new criteria. If you're currently claiming free school meals, but do not meet the new criteria, your child will continue to receive free school meals until the end of the Universal Credit rollout period.

This will apply even if your earnings rise above the new threshold or if you stop being entitled to Universal Credit. The Universal Credit rollout is currently expected to complete in March 2025. Once Universal Credit is fully rolled out, your

child will keep their free school meal until the end of their current phase of education, i.e. primary or secondary.





- If you are interested in completing this in the Autumn term 2024 speak with your parents and then email Mr Rankin.






We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Arbor App


Dropping off and collecting your daughter from school
